**PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION'S LUTTICH NAMED  
TO NATIONAL MANUFACTURED HOME POST**

LINCOLN - The director of the Nebraska Public Service Commission's Department of Housing and Recreational Vehicles has been named to another national post as part of his responsibilities with manufactured homes.

Mark Luttich, who has worked in the housing regulatory arm of the Nebraska state government for 27 years, was elected last week as co-chair of the Council of State Administrative Agencies (COSAA) for manufactured homes. "Mark's election to this position is a great testimonial to the high quality of staff that serves Nebraskans through the Public Service Commission," Commission Chairman Jerry Vap of McCook said. "This recognizes the leadership that Mark exerts within the manufactured home industry as well as within the regulatory community."

As co-chair of COSAA, Luttich will serve with incumbent co-chair Curtis McIver of Virginia. A native of Geneva, Luttich replaces Eric Borg of Arizona. COSAA serves as a liaison between its 36-member states and HUD on manufactured home regulation.

Mr. Luttich is also chair of the National Conference of States on Building Codes and Standards, Inc. (NCSBCS) Factory Built Structures Committee. NCSBCS is an organization based in Herndon, Virginia, focused on assisting states and local governments with their implementation of adopted building codes and required plan review and inspection for all types of factory built housing and site-built housing.

Manufactured homes are built to federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) standards. Modular housing units are built to the International Residential Code (IRC) and the National Electrical

Code (NEC). Nebraska has thirteen manufacturing factories regulated by the Public Service Commission located in Aurora, Central City, Gering, Grant, Kearney, Lincoln, Minden, Stratton, Valentine, Valparaiso, Wayne and York.
